Here is a thought from last week's homily: Joseph, patron saint of workers, blending skill with charity, silent carpenter, we praise you!

I made ramps for my little pickup truck...out of wood. The box of the truck is small, so I cut the boards in half and spliced them together with a hefty hinge. I used the ramps for the first time for loading a gas grill into the truck. The grill is heavy but not THAT heavy. The ramps bowed at the hinges. I am not positive that they will collapse if I try to load a lawn tractor or even my scooter. In the end I have ramps for light things...things that I really don't need ramps for.

Now I am brainstorming how to build ramp supports. I think I can design a support to use at the hinge so that the ramps don't collapse. Or I could use a car jack. Or I could carry bricks in the back of the truck and stack them up under the ramp when used. Or I could add some cable supports so that the ramps look like a suspension bridge when used. How cool would that be? Or...I could admit that the project is a bust and start over.

Has this ever happened to you when it comes to your faith commitments? A work of charity may seem like a good idea. When you are in the thick of it you realize that something isn't working. This is when we need to do one of two things; pray or trust.

Sometimes an idea is born in my head and it is not inspired by the Holy Spirit. It becomes an up-hill battle, doors close and I am in turmoil. This is a time to pray. This is a time to beg the Holy Spirit to make clear to me the direction of the work, even if his guidance is to abandon it. I need to pray with an open heart, which means that I am willing to admit a mistake.

A blessed work can be up hill, but all the right doors open at the right time. Somehow things come together, and I know that it isn't my doing. This is a time to trust, especially when I am tired and tempted to discouragement.

Begin with prayer. Trust in the Holy Spirit. And then pray more.

About my pickup ramps...pretty soon the truck will be full of stuff to make the bad ramp work. If that's what I want to do, who is to stop me!

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
