Managing sacks is a part of life for me. Plastic grocery bags for one. They need to be stored. I have a brother that folds them individually and stacks them in a square tower he made just for this. I stuff mine in a big cloth sock. When there are too many, I am not good at recycling them.

I have a big gift bag in which I keep other gift bags. Right now I have a huge bag—maybe 25 gallons—on the laundry room floor. I don't know what to do with it. I have cloth bags and special bags from merchants that I am supposed to use for future purchases.

Jesus said to his apostles, "Take nothing for the journey, neither walking stick nor sack for food..." (Luke 9:1-6). They do not need a sack to carry things; they are not to prepare for their immediate future needs. They are to rely on God—radically—on this missionary journey.

Later in the gospel (Luke 22) Jesus will instead tell his disciples to take a sack and a money bag. They will need provisions in the more hostile circumstances that will follow the passion and death of Jesus.

Sack or no sack. In a sense, the gospel authorized both. A radical dependence on God is not optional. A radical dependence on God will form us in knowledge and prudence regarding the need for sacks now and what we put in them.

I would observe that for many, we tire of this discernment. We keep ample sacks on hand, and we take any and everything with us wherever we go, having come to believe that God doesn't care. God cares. We need to listen.
