Here is a thought from last week's homily: *We want religion to be cathartic--we want to feel good at the end of our prayer, or, at least, we don't want to feel worse.*

A bully is powerful only so long as no one bigger is in the room.

I was never bullied as a kid in high school. I was scrawny and dorky and worth of a bully's time. What saved me was that I had four older brothers in high school at the same time. Any of them could have pummeled any bully-peer of mine.

In the synagogue, a demon cried out in a loud voice, "Ha! What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us?" (Lk 4: 31-37)

This demon had been tormenting a man for who knows how long. This bully presumed that he could push Jesus around as well. Jesus rebuked the demon. He ordered the demon out of the man, and the demon left. The bully had been put in his place by a word from Jesus. The demon was over-powered without Jesus lifting a hand. The people were amazed!

Later, Jesus did lift a hand. He offered it to another bully--the soldier who nailed it to the cross. If the soldier felt powerful, he was wrong. Jesus offered himself freely and completely for us in obedience to his Heavenly Father.

All of us have been bullied. We have been harassed by evil spirits. The word of Jesus is no less powerful today. The one who calmed the sea with a word and transformed bread and wine into his body and blood has conquered evil, sin and death. He still has power over evil, and, in His name, so do we.


