Have you ever noticed that we often cling to things as they've always been? Sometimes it feels that the old saying is true: "Better the devil we know than the devil we don't." But God never wants us to settle into a routine way of thinking or acting that is based in laziness or nostalgia, or even fear. God is always nudging us forward into new experiences of grace. That's some of what is happening in today's readings from scripture.

The ancient Hebrew people cried out in the desert to Moses. They were jubilant when they were released from Egypt and grateful that their slavery was coming to an end. But when they were thirsty, tired and confused, they lashed out at Moses because they didn't know what lay ahead or when they would reach their promised land and a new life.

We may also doubt God's presence and look for someone to blame when we experience anxiety. We need some kind of reassurance to keep us steadfast. The people of Israel found reassurance in the form of water from a rock. The support of someone who offers unlikely assistance can feel like water from a rock in the middle of the desert.

Today's Gospel offers us a similar lesson. For centuries, faithful Jews avoided Samaritans and the region in which they lived. Jesus' encounter with a Samaritan woman would have raised all kinds of red flags. Jesus would have none of that and paints a new way. Both sides of this divide could be victorious in His messianic age. Let's give Jesus our fears, our nostalgia, and our laziness and see what new thing He has in store.


