History of the Advent Wreath

The origin of the Advent wreath has been traced back to Germany, though the exact dates are unknown. Historians have suggested that pre-Christian Germanic peoples would light candles around wreaths in the dark winter months in anticipation of the warmer, lighter months in springtime. This tradition likely evolved into an "Advent wreath" at some point during the Middle Ages, transforming the pagan tradition into a Christian one. Rev. William Saunders explained that "By 1600, both Catholics and Lutherans had more formal practices surrounding the Advent wreath." Ultimately, the Advent wreath tradition spread beyond Germany and into other areas of the world, namely throughout the western Church.



HOPE-The first candle, which is purple, symbolizes hope. It is sometimes called the "Prophecy Candle" I remembrance of the prophets, especially Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. It represents the expectation felt in anticipation of the coming Messiah.



What's in a song?!

Over the course of the next four weeks of Advent we will be singing combinations of the traditional "O" Antiphons at Mass.

Just what are the "O" Antiphons?

Traditionally sung on the seven days preceding Christmas Eve, these choral prayers were based on Messianic titles used by the prophets in the Old Testament. Intended for Vespers (Evening Prayer), a different verse is sung each evening of Advent beginning December 17. From the first letter of each oblation of Jesus, an acrostic is formed, which is a poem or series of lines in which certain letters form a message when read in sequence. These oblations are: O Sapientia (Wisdom), Adonai (Lord), Radix (Root of Jesse), Clavis (The Key of David), Oriens (Dayspring), Rex (King), Emmanuel (God With Us). When reversed, we have the Latin expression, "ERO CRAS," which means, "I will be present tomorrow."

Thinking you don't know the "O" Antiphons? Actually, you DO!

The verses of "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" are taken directly from the "O" Antiphons! Although the traditional use of the "O" Antiphons is the seven days before Christmas, they can serve as a shared meditation throughout the Advent season in the body of the Mass. For more history or explanation of the "O" Antiphons you can search for them on YouTube and listen to them chanted in English and Latin.
