The two-thousand and twenty-fourth year since Our Lord's birth is nearly upon us! There are two matters to which I would like to direct your attention on this last day of the year. The first is to renew my begging that each family in the parish increase it's Sunday offering by \$15 per week, so that we can make the payments on our roof loan each month. Each month, this payment is approximately \$1300 and it has never been included in the budget since the loan was taken out. That is why it has looked, for the last year or so, that we have drastically increased our spending, and it is also why our general operating bank account has been slowly decreasing. We can reduce expenses, of course, but the amount we can cut without affecting employees is very limited. We really do need an increase in what we are given in the collection basket. I know that things are sometimes extra tight financially and that not everyone is able to help. I am praying that those who are able will assist us with this monthly expense.

The second thing I'd like to share with you is that the Diocese of Crookston has a new policy on Deacons. Beginning on January 1st, they are permitted to wear clerical attire while they are engaged in sacred ministry. They may always wear a clerical collar on parish property, and they may wear it off campus when they are active in ministry, such as for Communion Calls at hospitals and nursing homes or at private homes, and for Wake Services at funeral homes and Burials at cemeteries, and at other times when they have been delegated to represent the parish. Though the ancient custom of the Church is that clerical attire, our bishop has elected to modify the custom, and he has decreed that Deacons should wear a gray clerical shirt in this diocese, rather than one in black, so they won't be mistaken for priests. Many permanent deacons have a personal custom of wearing what is called a deacon cross on a string around their necks. (It is a cross with a diagonal stole draped across it.) They are not permitted to wear this cross at the same time as they are wearing a clerical shirt. To see a man in a clerical shirt with a cross hanging from his neck over his chest is the distinctive dress of a bishop, so we don't want the deacons confused for a bishop either. What a world that would be!

How much should we support our adult children? We have a niece and a daughter who are both healthy, capable, and in their twenties. We have set boundaries and continue to give to them but they just can't seem to get their act together. Would it be unchristian to cut them off?

The Catechism of the Catholic Church describes in detail the duties of family members toward each other (CCC 2214–33). Parents are responsible to ensure that their children grow up in faith and to meet their basic needs. Children should show respect toward their parents and, as they grow older, assist them as needed. As children become adults, they should take on responsibility for themselves and parents are not to pressure them into choices of a profession or a spouse, while at the same time, "giving their children judicious advice...." (CCC 2230). At some point, children need to become responsible adults, which brings us to your point.

You seem to have done what is required as parents. At the same time, you would not want to abandon young adults if physical, mental, or emotional factors prevent them from assuming the responsibility of adulthood. If they are healthy, capable young people they should be able to progress in life without your financial assistance. To help them toward this goal, you may want to set very specific limits, perhaps with the help of a counselor, and then consistently follow those limits. •


