In a few weeks, our parishes will be visited by Father Christon Muhero. He is from Africa, from the Archdiocese of Blantyre in the nation of Malawi, but he is presently serving in our diocese in Warroad, Williams, and Baudette. The Diocese of Crookston is excited to be in the early stages of a special relationship with the Archdiocese of Blantyre.

Bishop Cozzens has pledged our support for an ongoing Mission Appeal to construct a rural secondary school where 17,000 primary students in the Blantyre Archdiocese do not have access to a high school. Some parishioners from our diocese are members of an organization called TTE (Transformation Through Education), which is leading this project. The school will open its doors this fall to 200 students - 100 young men and 100 young women. Please be generous!

We are providing this information now, so that when Fr. Christon comes to share his testimony at Mass, you will have already had some time to consider a donation to this good cause.

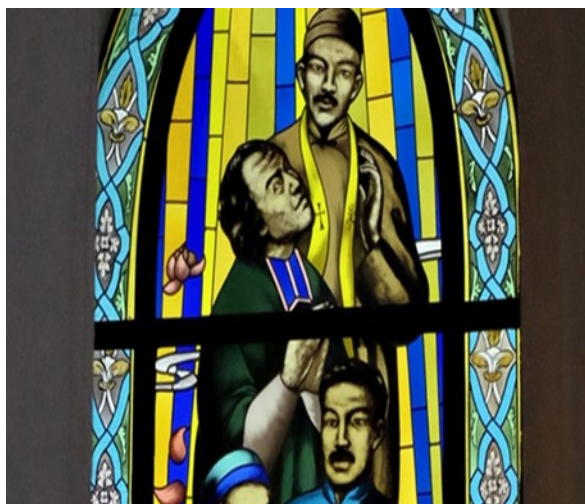

Saints of the Day for July 9

Saint Augustine Zhao Rong's and Companions' Story

(d. 1648 – 1930)

Christianity arrived in China by way of Syria in the 600s. Depending on China's relations with the outside world, Christianity over the centuries was free to operate openly or had to operate secretly.

The 120 martyrs in this group died between 1648 and 1930. Eighty-seven of them were born in China, and were children, parents, catechists, or laborers,

ranging in age from nine years to 72. This group includes four Chinese diocesan

priests. The 33 foreign-born martyrs were mostly priests or women religious, especially from the Order of

Preachers, the Paris Foreign Mission Society, the Friars Minor, Society of Jesus, Society of St. Francis de Sales (Salesians), and Franciscan Missionaries of Mary.

Augustine Zhao Rong was a Chinese soldier who accompanied Bishop John Gabriel Taurin Dufresse of the Paris Foreign Mission Society to his martyrdom in Beijing. Not long after his baptism, Augustine was ordained as a diocesan priest. He was martyred in 1815.

Beatified in groups at various times, these 120 martyrs were canonized together in Rome on October 1, 2000.

Reflection

The People's Republic of China and the Roman Catholic Church each have well over a billion members, but there are only about 12 million Catholics in China. The reasons for that are better explained by historical conflicts than by a wholesale rejection of the Good News of Jesus Christ. The Chinese-born martyrs honored by today's feast were regarded by their persecutors as dangerous because they were considered allies of enemy, Catholic countries. The martyrs born outside China often tried to distance themselves from European political struggles relating to China, but their persecutors saw them as Westerners and therefore, by definition, anti-Chinese.

The Good News of Jesus Christ is intended to benefit all peoples; today's martyrs knew that. May 21st-century Christians live in such a

Pope Francis' monthly prayer intention **JULY For The Pastoral Care of The Sick**

Let us pray that the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, bestows the Lord's strength to those who receive it and to their loved ones, and that it may become for everyone an ever more visible sign of compassion and hope.



It's difficult to understand the life of St Henry without considering the strong Christian formation he received from his childhood. Henry was born in Bamberg in 973, the son of the Duke of Bavaria. He grew up in a profoundly Christian atmosphere, receiving his education first from the canons at Hildesheim, and later, in Ratisbon (now Regensburg), from St Wolfgang, the Bishop of that city. He succeeded his father as duke; and later his cousin, Otto III, as King of Germany in 1002. Two years later, he added the title King of Italy. In 1014 Henry was crowned Holy Roman Emperor by Pope Benedict VIII.

The Emperor and the Cluniac reform

Henry's support for the moral reform begun from the Abbey of Cluny was significant. Cluny's abbot, St Odilo, was also one of Henry's counsellors. The Cluniac Reforms affected not only monastic life, but the whole life of the Church. He helped the Church combat simony (the buying and selling of ecclesiastical goods and offices), and

promoted clerical celibacy. In 1022, together with Pope Benedict VIII, Henry presided over the Council of Pavia, which published 7 canons against clerical concubinage, and in favour of the defence of the patrimony of the Church. He restored episcopal sees, and founded the Diocese of Bamberg. His interest in the liturgy can be seen in his desire to introduce recitation of the Creed to the Sunday Mass.

Political actions

Henry was also a decisive political leader. The early part of his reign required him to defend his claim to the throne against various rebellious lords. He allied himself with pagan Slavic tribes against the Polish Duke Boleslaw, a decision for which he was criticized. In Italy he defeated Arduin of Ivrea, who had been elected King of Italy (although the title was not recognized universally). Henry also came into conflict with the Byzantine empire.

Love for Cunigunde

One of the most striking aspects of Henry's life was his love for his wife, St Cunigunde. The couple did not have children, which has given rise to the belief that the spouses had taken a mutual vow of chastity, although some historians dispute this. In any case, contrary to a common medieval practice, Saint Henry did not repudiate his wife; his decision to remain with her contributed in no small part to his reputation for sanctity. His fidelity bore witness to his deep love for his wife, and his profound respect for the Sacrament of Marriage.

Henry II was canonized by Pope Eugene III in 1146.
