The fourth priority for parishes is accompaniment.

If you ever had to go to difficult meeting, you sure do appreciated it when a friend offered to accompany you. This need for accompaniment is especially true in the spiritual life. Many of us are on a difficult journey as we face economic stresses. Challenges in rearing children, violence in neighborhoods, and other trials. As a church community, we should make sure that we are walking with one another, helping one another alonf the bumpy road of life, and making sure that we leave no neighbor behind. As missionary disciples, we also help one another to grow spiritually and to live the gospel more fully through pray, sacrament, faith formation, and friendship.

Just as Jesus walked with two of his disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24: 13-35), the risen Lord invites us to join our brothers and sister on their journey to him. Some of them may be disillusioned or confused, but like our Lord, we should engage them, draw them out, and allow thenm to express their concerns.

We can also answer their questions and share our understanding of Scripture with them. With faith rekindled in their hearts, we pray that their eyes would be opened to who Jesus is.

The fifth core mission priority is sending forth.

I've already noted how parishes should constantly be reaching out, not only to parishioners who currently practice the faith, but aso to those who, for whatever reason, stay away. The parish also needs to be involved in the social and charitable needs of the broader community. Parishioners must be convinced of and committed to the missionary impulse of the Church and our need to go out "to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). This means that a parish must be comprised of missionary disciples—followers of Christ and members of his body, the Church, who are equipped to engage in personal witness, service, friendship, and invitations to "Come and see" (John 1:46).

From the Desk of Fr. Hamness:

In the Scriptures at Mass today, the Lord appoints 72 people to head out into the unknown to spread the Gospel, and he sends them out in pairs. In elementary school we often had to pair up and do things, especially if we went on a field trip. It was a way to help the teacher keep track of us by having someone else also responsible for each of us. The U.S. Army has taken the advice of our Lord and of our elementary school teachers too. The Army has the Battle Buddy System. A battle buddy is a partner assigned to a soldier in the United States Army. Each battle buddy is expected to assist their partner both in and out of combat. A battle buddy is not only intended for company and friendship, but also for improved mental health as well; since each watches their partner's actions, a battle buddy can save their fellow soldier's life by noticing negative thoughts and feelings and intervening to provide help.

Now, here is the question I pose to you. Since our Lord intends for us to go out two by two to evangelize the world, who is your battle buddy? Who is your friend that will be with you in the Christian life and help you spread the Gospel and lead others to Jesus Christ, and care for your soul and well-being?



Saints of the Week



Wednesday, July 9th Saint Augustine Zhao Rong and his 119 companions were a group of 120 Catholic martyrs who were canonized by Pope John Paul II in 2000. They are also known as the Martyr

Saints of China. The group includes 87 Chinese Catholics and 33 Western missionaries who were persecuted and killed between the mid-17th century and 1930, primarily due to their Christian faith. Augustine Zhao Rong:

He was a Chinese diocesan priest who was martyred in 1815. He was initially a soldier who, after witnessing the martyrdom of Bishop John Gabriel Taurin Dufresse, converted to Christianity, became a priest, and was later martyred.

Optional Memorial:

Their optional memorial is celebrated on July 9th, though the Church All of September is OPEN in China observes their feast day on January 27th.



Friday, July 11th St Benedict, Abbot

Patron Saint of Europe, monks and religious orders, architects, dying people, cave explorers, schoolchildren, agricultural workers, civil engineers, and coppersmiths
