From the Desk of Fr. Hamness:

Today’s Gospel mentions the watches of the night. These aren’t wrist-watches with luminous dials that you can see in the dark. (Pause for laughter from my lame joke.) In ancient cultures the nighttime hours were divided into four separate watches, each three hours in length. The first watch was 6-9 pm. The second watch was 9 pm to midnight; the third watch was midnight to 3 am, and the fourth watch was 3-6 am. Originally this system would have developed as 4 separate shifts for the town guardsmen, so that no one would have to stay outside awake in the cold all night long. Eventually, this became the standard way of speaking about periods of time during the night. They didn’t use specific hours because there was no way to know them precisely enough at night. A Sundial could give them more precise time during the day...but the moon was not a source of light bright enough or steady enough for there to be such a thing as a “moondial” at night. For those who needed to wake up at a specific time at night, they had candles with metal nails stuck into them. If they knew how far a candle would burn in the course of one hour, then they could calculate how far to down the length of the candle to insert the nail, so that the wax around the nail would melt and make the nail fall out of the candle and onto a metal plate, thus making a noise to wake them up. Now you know a little more about ancient time-keeping.

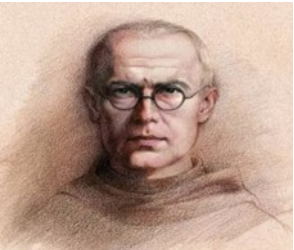
